Hauge's revival would have fallen flat without people inviting him into their homes, hosting small crowds in their living rooms, and fathers restarting catechetical instruction at their dinner tables. The AFLC would have died out long ago if it weren't for the faithfulness of the everyday believers coming to church on Sundays, supporting their pastors, raising their children in the faith, coming to the Annual Conference, and praying and supporting the ministries of the Association.
